Bhopal Awareness Day, Dec 3rd

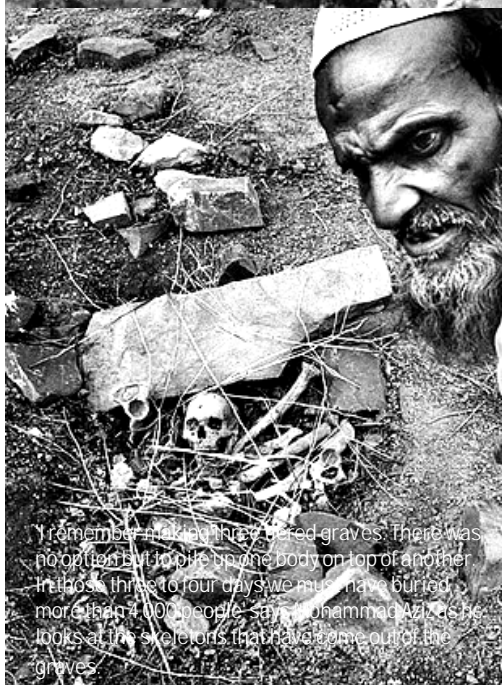
Wednesday, 10am-5pm at the Gregory Plaza (Speedway and 21st)

On December 3rd 1984, over 40 tons of highly poisonous gas leaked out of the pesticide factory of Union Carbide in Bhopal, India. An estimated half-million people were poisoned, and the health impacts continue to this day. The death toll is over 20,000 now. It is estimated that 10-15 are dying every month. Union Carbide fled India, leaving behind huge rusting vats of toxic waste, which are leaking into the ground water today.
